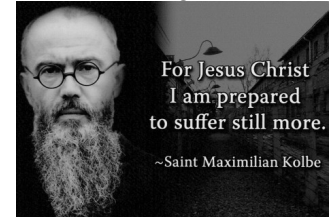

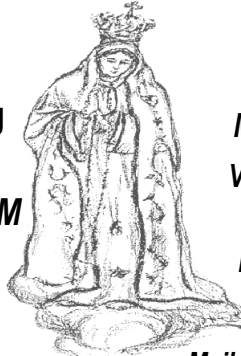

The Israelites knew when the Passover was coming, and so were not in fear, but had faith and courage, "putting into effect with one accord the divine institution." In this we can see a foretelling of the Eucharist that we celebrate according to Christ's command, "Do this in memory of me."

We see that Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, and Jacob died in faith, although they did not see fulfillment of the promise. We live in hope that our faith will be fulfilled every time we celebrate this sacrament. We too are not to be afraid, but to have hope that our faith will be fulfilled in the coming of Christ.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

When Pope Pius XII died in 1958, there was the usual buzz of speculation about likely successors. Cardinal Agajanian, Patriarch of the Armenians, was highly thought of as a likely choice. This took many Catholics by surprise, since he had never celebrated the same liturgy as Pope Pius, but followed ancient Armenian customs according to the Eastern Church, which veils the Eucharistic liturgy from sight by a series of curtains, and in which the priest kneels while the people stand for Communion.

In the years that followed, the Second Vatican Council would affirm the dignity and independence of the Eastern Churches, in complete union with Rome, yet different in patterns of life and worship. We have the same faith, the same sacraments, and the same pope. Yet everywhere in the world our separate Churches are combined into families held together by the ministry of bishops. All of this serves as warning: If you ever say, "But we've always done it this way," you are on very thin ice indeed!

Raymund Kolbe was born on January 8, 1894, in Poland. St. Maximilian Kolbe was very active in promoting the Immaculate Virgin Mary. He is known as the Apostle of Consecration to Mary. St. Maximilian Kolbe's dedication to our Blessed Virgin Mary is said to be attributed to his mother who recited the Angelus, the Holy Rosary, and the Litany to Our Lady daily. He had a vision of our Blessed Virgin Mary when he was 12. "Our Lady showed him two crowns: one red, the other white. When asked to choose which he preferred, he chose both: to remain pure and undivided in his love for God and the Blessed Virgin, and to be a martyr." At the age of 21, St. Maximilian Kolbe earned a doctorate in philosophy. By the age of 28, St. Maximilian Kolbe would also earn a doctorate in theology. He founded monasteries in Poland and in both Japan and India. During WWII, he provided shelter for refugees and hid 2,000 Jews. St. Maximilian Kolbe's publishing house issued many anti-Nazi German publications. After his monastery was shut down, he was arrested by the German Gestapo and taken to the Pawiak prison and eventually transferred to Auschwitz. During this time, St. Maximilian Kolbe was subjected to beatings and other ill-treatment. A fellow prisoner who had tried to escape and would be punished by starving to death, cried out he had a wife and children and St. Maximilian Kolbe volunteered and took his place. Out of the 10 who were selected to be starved to death in an underground bunker, St. Maximilian Kolbe was the last left alive after two weeks of starvation and dehydration. He was then killed by an injection of carbolic acid. It is said that he calmly waited for the needle, raising his arm. Throughout these struggles, St. Maximilian Kolbe never abandoned his priesthood. St. Maximilian Kolbe died on August 14 and his remains were cremated on August 15, the feast day of the Assumption of Mary. Saint Pope John Paul II visited St. Maximilian Kolbe's death chamber in Auschwitz in 1979, and there proclaimed him "Patron Saint of our Difficult Age." St. Maximilian Kolbe was canonized as saint by Saint Pope John Paul II in 1982. St. Maximilian Kolbe is the patron saint of families, prisoners, journalists, political prisoners, drug addicts and the pro-life movement.

Twentieth Sunday In Ordinary Time

All of today's readings speak about people on the move in search of a new homeland. The reading from Wisdom reminds us in the night of Passover when the people of Israel, trusting in God's promises, journeyed from slavery to freedom in a new homeland God had promised.

In the reading from the Hebrews, we hear how Abraham placed his faith and trust in God's promises and journeyed to a land promised him and his descendants. "He went out, not knowing where he was to go." He simply and faithfully trusted in God's guidance. As the reading states, "Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen."

The Gospel reading presents us with a parable in which Jesus reminds his followers to trust in the Father's promises: "Do not be afraid any longer, little flock, for your Father is pleased to give you the kingdom." Followers are to be patient as they await the return of their master, who will bring them into their new homeland. Jesus touches on the yearning for this eternal homeland that lies in the human heart. However, Jesus adds that we must be attentive and prepared for the arrival of this homeland. We must do our part and act as faithful stewards of our talents and obligations. "Much will be required of the person entrusted with much, and still more will be demanded of the person entrusted with more."

We do not journey alone. Our journey is united with others also responding to God's call to prepare for the coming of God's kingdom. Ours is the task to support them through lives of service and solidarity.

Mary's Assumption into Heaven August 15

Mary went to a place we all hope to be some day—in heaven with Jesus! Celebrate with balloons and a "Hail Mary" together. Invite godparents or godchildren to celebrate with you.

The Assumption

Stories of how Mary died and went to heaven have been circulating in the church since the second century. Around the year 600, Emperor Maurice set the feast day on August 15 in the Roman empire. In 1950 Pope Pius XII proclaimed the Assumption an article of faith. Here are a few lines from A New Catechism to help explain its significance: "Mary has already been raised from the dead, body and soul. Of the other dead we may only say that they will be made alive, they are about to arise, but we acknowledge that Mary is already glorified."

"Just as Christ's resurrection is effective among us through his forceful, vivid presence in the life of the world, so too, is the glory or the 'Assumption' of Mary...We can experience the presence of Christ and Mary by living on earth in the Spirit of Christ and by speaking to them in prayer. The same may be said of the other dead. Some great saints and good people are more powerfully present than others. Does this perhaps indicate that they are already further on the way of resurrection?"

Pick Your Own Apples

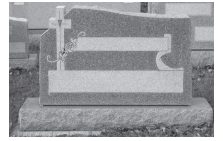
