# Feast of The Holy Innocents December 28, 2018

Holy Innocents – also known as Childermas, Innocents' Day and Feast of the Holy Innocents – is a holiday which falls on different days in the Western and Eastern Christian churches. In Western churches, it is celebrated on December 28th and in Eastern churches, it is celebrated on December 29th. The purpose of this holiday is to commemorate the massacre of children by King Herod as he was attempting to kill baby Jesus. These children have been regarded as the first martyrs of the early church and has been celebrated way before the fifth century when it was celebrated as a part of Epiphany. However, by the fifth century, it had become a separate festival and eventually became a saint's day.

#### The Massacre of the Innocents

The story of Herod is told in the Book of Matthew Chapter 2, verses 1 through 18. In this story, Herod was a king of Judea that was very unliked by his people because he was indifferent to religion and had connections with the Roman Empire. This unpopularity caused him to be extremely fearful that someone was going to kill him and seize his throne, so he took every opportunity to eliminate his rivals and make sure that he had no enemies.

Then one day, Eastern astrologers came to him and asked him about the whereabouts of the "newborn king of the Jews." They were told that Jewish Scriptures named Bethlehem as the place in which the next Messiah would be born, and having seen this king's star, decided to pay him homage. Herod told them they should report back to him when they found him, so he too could pay homage to the newborn king. These astrologers found Jesus, the newborn king, and offered up their gifts to him. However, they received a warning from an angel that told him to avoid Herod, which they did. Jesus was then able to escape to Egypt. Unable to find Jesus, Herod became enraged and ordered all of the boys under the age of two in Bethlehem to be put to death.

#### History of Holy Innocents

Holy Innocents as a holiday can be traced back to the year 485 A.D when it was celebrated as a feast day in the Western Church, or more specifically in the Leonine Sacramentary. However, it wasn't celebrated as its own feast day but was instead a part of the Feast of the Epiphany and was celebrated in January. Eventually, sometime after the 5th century, it became decoupled from Epiphany and became its own feast day. In modern times, it has been known as Holy Innocent's Day, Childermas, Children's Mass and Innocents' Day.

It is celebrated on December 27th in the Maronite Church, Syriac Orthodox Church, and the Syro-Malankara Catholic Church; on December 28th in the Church of England, the Lutheran Church and the Roman Catholic Church; and on January 10th in the Syro-Malabar Catholic 12.

#### Celebrating Holy Innocents

This holiday has been practiced in different ways by different people all throughout history. Prior to the 17th century, it was customary to spank your children at sunrise on Holy Innocents to remind them of the suffering the innocents of Bethlehem had to endure. Today, however, that practice has fortunately died out for the most part. Up until 1962, priests in the Roman Catholic church would wear violet vestments for this holiday. However, it was changed to red vestments during that year.

Nowadays, people often attend churches in which the priest say a prayer called the Blessing of the Children; in Mexico, it is celebrated with pranks – much in the same way that April Fools Day is celebrated.

### December 23, 2018 Scripture Reflection

Today's Scripture readings are filled with joyful expectation in the face of incredible odds. In the First Reading, the prophet issues an oracle of hope to a people whom he had been railing against for their failure to act justly. Though they must pay the price for their sins now, in God's time, a messiah- king will be raised up from among the least of them. This messiah-king will act in peace and be peace! Bethlehem was David's hometown. Hence, the messiah-king will be of the lineage of David. The woman of whom he speaks is the mother of this long-awaited messiah-king, but she remains nameless.

In the Gospel, we are privileged to imagine the tender and private encounter of two seemingly insignificant women. Both would have been the target of much gossip---one because she was pregnant before her marriage was finalized and the other because she had been denied children for all the years of her marriage. The former would become the mother of the messiah-king and the latter the mother of John the Baptist, whom God chose to announce the long-awaited reign of God.

It is one thing to find grace in dramatic events; it is quite another to catch sight of God in the everyday. In this Sunday's Gospel reading, a poor traveler arrives, and an unborn baby stirs in the womb as his mother greets the traveler with joy. This account contains little drama, but in Luke's recounting, grace saturates the scene. Luke wrote to remind his audience never to stop seeking the divine presence. Even the simplest moment has in it a world-changing significance for anyone who is ready to find the work of God.

More than any other New Testament writer, Luke draws his readers to Christ's three arrivals among humanity. The first arrival was the nativity, the second occurs daily among his disciples in the Spirit, and the final appearance will usher in the end of time. It is that second, daily, arrival that Luke highlights in this Gospel passage. We are to be attentive and alert, like Mary and Elizabeth. Christ continues to arrive each day in our lives. We must make sure not to miss these opportunities of grace.

#### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In ancient pagan Rome, these days in mid-December were a time for general slacking off at work and far too much rejoicing. The period of leisure after the harvest and a whole cluster of pagan festivals were a force for the church to reckon with. The Saturnalia, breaking out on December 17, was a time of high living and loose morals. Christians were advised by their bishops to drop out of the mayhem and do some serious fasting. A famous church council at Saragossa in Spain made a season of fasting mandatory from December 17 to December 23, exactly coinciding with the Saturnalia. The bishops at that time were perhaps less concerned with preparing for Christmas than with resisting the kind of loose living going on.

Modern times have restored a bit of the Saturnalia spirit to our culture, so that a general period of partying with a vague connection to religion is now upon us. How does a Christian keep balance? The practice of charity by remembering the poor in our gift-giving, of hospitality in finding a place at our holiday tables for the poor and lonely, and of daily prayer in the home and at church are great helps. Although Advent is not a penitential season like Lent, it is a time for making room in our lives for what matters most.






