# Our Lady of Fatima Parish

When the new bishop arrives, after he has had a couple of months to survey the 'big picture,' he will soon have to consider if he has to close parishes. Some bishops loathe doing this and will find any pastoral excuse to keep every parish open. Others will take a businesslike approach and close whatever parish appears to be any kind of a drain on the diocese [personnel, financial, resources,....]

Whatever approach the new bishop takes with regard to closing parishes he will need proof that there is good sound reasoning behind his decision in each particular case.

One wonders what sort of proof would be compelling enough for the new bishop to decide to keep Our Lady of Fatima open as a fully functioning parish in the Diocese, the City, and the 5<sup>th</sup> Ward.

Let's put on the shelf (hopefully forever) that speech we've been getting for over twenty years now: that Our Lady of Fatima is on the "chopping block." Do you have any idea how many people have died giving only a ½ or ¼ of their energy to parochial life because they were convinced that: "they [the enemy] are going to close us down anyway, so what's the use?" How sad!

Remember what the old cartoon character, Pogo, said about the enemy? Pogo said: "We have met the enemy... and he is us." Yes, it is only because of us and what we do or don't do that the doors of Our Lady of Fatima will remain open or be padlocked shut.

Were I to be the new bishop [don't worry, that's never going to happen] I'd want to know how these folks at OLF view the Eucharist in their lives. Almost 2000 years ago St. Ignatius of Antioch said that wherever you find the Eucharist there you find the Church Christ founded. More recently John Paul II reminded us that the Eucharist is the Alpha and the Omega (that's the beginning and the end) of the Christian Life.

So as the new bishop I'd put on a suit and tie and just show up unannounced at all three weekend Masses and all five weekday Masses and see how many people are there, and how well they behave – you know – dress, talk or not, genuflect, kneel, and how fully they participate – you know, respond, sing, sit, stand, are attentive to the homily – even long and boring ones – receive under both species (host and cup,) and generally exhibit an awareness of *what the heaven* is going on. Then, I drop in at odd hours of the day to see how many people were making either a Eucharist Holy Hour or a quickie visit to the Blessed Sacrament – the Alpha and Omega of the Christian Life.

If I saw that the building was well cared for and that there were no Bill collectors at the Rectory door I'd just assume that these folks can afford financially to maintain their own parish.

If you see a well dressed stranger wandering around here in the next few months [or weeks,] remember, first impressions tend to be lasting impressions.

## SMOKING

Some statistics that may help in putting smoking in its proper context:

- Smoking kills more Americans each year than AIDS, alcohol, auto accidents, fires, homicide, illegal drugs and suicide combined.
- Approximate number of deaths per year:
  - AIDS: 31,000
  - Alcohol: 105,000
  - Auto Accidents: 49,000
  - Cocaine and Crack: 3,300
  - Fires: 4,000
  - Heroin and Morphine: 2,400
  - Homicide: 22,000
  - Secondary Smoke: 53,000
  - Smoking: 434,000
  - Suicides: 31,000
