50 Maxims for becoming a Saint from St Alphonsus Liguori


1. To desire ardently to increase in the love of Jesus Christ.
2. Often to make acts of love towards Jesus Christ. Immediately on waking, and before going to sleep, to make an act of love, seeking always to unite your own will to the will of Jesus Christ.
3. Often to meditate on his Passion.
4. Always to ask Jesus Christ for his love.
5. To communicate often, and many times in the day to make spiritual Communions.
6. Often to visit the Most Holy Sacrament.
7. Every morning to receive from the hands of Jesus Christ himself your own cross.
8. To desire Paradise and death, in order to be able to love Jesus Christ perfectly and for ever
9. Often to speak of the love of Jesus Christ.
10. To accept contradictions for the sake of Jesus Christ.
11. To rejoice in the happiness of God.
12. To do that which is most pleasing to Jesus Christ, and not to refuse him anything.
13. To desire and to endeavor that all should love Jesus Christ.
14. To pray always for sinners and for the souls in purgatory.
15. To drive from your heart every affection that does not belong to Jesus Christ.
16. Always to have recourse to most holy Mary, that she may obtain for us the love of Jesus Christ.
17. To honor Mary in order to please Jesus Christ.
18. To seek to please Jesus Christ in all your actions.
19. To offer yourself to Jesus Christ to suffer any pain for his love.

How do you eat an Elephant?



You're right! One bite at a time. Several serious, loyal, supportive, and cooperative, members of our parish have approached me saying they are totally on-board with the use of Latin in our Masses for any one of three reasons: 1) the last three Popes have insisted that we do so, 2) as a frequent reminder that it is the Latin Rite of the Roman 2000 year old Catholic Church to which we belong and 3) that in this age of pluralism and relativism we need an anchor to regularly remind us not only of who we are, but of who we are not.

A very practical example of that third reason was relayed to me by a very good priest friend of mine who recently told me of his experience while visiting a Catholic resident in a rest home owned and operated by a Protestant group. One Sunday he had just finished Anointing and giving Holy Communion to the very conscious and very alert Catholic resident. When the priest was about to leave the room one of those Protestant-cheerleader-types stuck her head in the doorway of this Catholic's room announcing that she was taking people to the Protestant service in the upstairs chapel. She spoke with such animation and conviction that even the priest was tempted to go along. The resident, however, couldn't resist the temptation and went right along with the enthusiastic apostate ... having just received the Real Presence of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament.

I guess an argument could be made for the fact that all older people fall somewhere along the line between the two extremes of either curmudgeons or cupcakes. Maybe the resident, wanting to be perceived as "being nice," just couldn't say "no thank you." My hope is that that resident and any other Catholic resident in that place has not fallen prey to the pluralistic notion of American relativism which holds that one religion is pretty much the same as (or as good as) another. That may be OK for others, but no real practicing member of the One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church founded by Jesus Christ can possibly have, and seriously hold that heretical view.

Back to our elephant! I'm told that any objection to, or discomfort with Latin in our weekend Masses is due not to the fact of Latin, but to the amount of Latin. Apparently I'm feeding my flock a Latin dish of elephantine proportions. I've been assured that probably every body is, if not really enthusiastic about, at least OK with the three shorter prayers sung in Latin, but a significant number of the folks taste the Latin Our Father as too much to chew on, let alone too much to digest.

What Mary said to the Angel, I say to you ... "Fiat voluntas tua."

Beginning with this Mass the Pater Noster will be done in English, All else remains the same. Dominus vobiscum.


