The different postures at Mass reinforce the meaning of the action in which we are taking part at that moment in our worship. STANDING is a sign of respect and honor, so we stand as the priest who represents Christ enters and leaves the liturgical assembly. When we stand we assume our full stature before God, not in pride, but in humble gratitude for the marvelous things God has done for us. We stand for the Gospel, the pinnacle of revelation. And in the United States, we stand for the reception of Communion, the Sacrament that unites us in a profound way with Christ. KNEELING signifies penance and awareness of our dependence on God. This posture is a sign of adoration. The bishops of our country have chosen that we kneel for the entire Eucharistic Prayer (particular to the United States). SITTING is the posture of listening and meditation. The assembly sits for the first reading, the sung psalm, and the second reading, and may sit or kneel after the Communion hymn is complete as we enter into communion thanksgiving

## CENTRAL MYSTERY OF THE CATHOLIC FAITH

Catholics believe in one God, in three divine Persons, the Blessed Trinity. The three Persons in one God have been revealed by God and are known to us as the Father, the Creator; the Son, the Redeemer; and the Holy Spirit, the Sanctifier. The mystery of the Holy Trinity, three Persons sharing one nature, is a central mystery of the Catholic faith.

### Traditional Prayer in Praise of the Trinity

*Glory be to the Father, and to the Son,

## THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

One of the first prayers you were taught as a child was "The Sign of the Cross." This short prayer combines the words and the gesture of "signing" yourself to serve as a reminder of the mysteries of faith. In using "The Sign of the Cross" you honor the Blessed Trinity and keep before you always the symbol of redemption, the cross.

Many Catholics "bless themselves," using "The Sign of the Cross" throughout each day. Upon entering a Catholic Church, it customary to dip two fingers into the holy water font at the door and use it to bless yourself.

Most private and public prayers start with "The Sign of the Cross." It is customary to begin and end prayers of personal devotion, such as, the Rosary, grace at meals, morning or evening prayer with it. Some Catholics bless themselves before beginning a task or a journey or if they are facing some difficulty. This traditional practice has been used by many Catholics from early-childhood.
