## **Altoona-Johnstown Annual Catholic Appeal Formula and Consequences**

- All parishes cumulative regular receipts for FY 2006-2007 = \$23,754,736.00
- 11% of that total = \$2,613,021.00 which is the 2008 ACA Diocesan Goal
- The Goal (\$2,613,021.00) divided by 41,414 which is the number of households in the diocese = \$63.10 which is the assessment per household for each household in the diocese
- \$63.10 times 180 (taxable) households in Our Lady of Fatima Parish = our Parish Goal of

## **\$11,358.00**

If we lived in an ideal parish in an ideal world, each of our 180 households would pledge \$63.10 (making 7 monthly payments of \$9.02 each.) We all know that isn't going to happen. Some can't, most who don't simply won't. Those who are able to, have to carry our brothers. I, your pastor, have pledged \$631.00 (\$90.14 per for 7 months) to carry 9 *ailing* members. And the load, it doesn't weigh me down at all - he ain't heavy - he's my brother.

*We, the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown, celebrated as a Holy Day of Obligation “the Ascension of the Lord” this past Thursday, May 1. Many of your Catholic friends and relatives living in other parts of the U.S. will be celebrating that feast this weekend. This weekend we, however, are celebrating the rather prosaic Seventh Sunday of Easter. What’s going on here? Below is a really good answer the pastor found on an internet Blog.*

**Ascension Thursday Sunday?**

A reader writes:

Why is Ascension Thursday a Holy Day of Obligation in some areas of the United States and not others?

This is a very good question. The simple, but confusing, answer is that Ascension Thursday is a Holy Day of Obligation everywhere in the United States. It's just that, in most dioceses, the *celebration* is transferred to the following Sunday. (So, in 2007, Ascension Thursday was May 17, but it was celebrated on Sunday, May 20, and in 2008 Ascension Thursday was May 1, but is being celebrated on Sunday, May 4.) Since Catholics are already obligated to attend Mass on Sunday, most people don't realize that Ascension is still a Holy Day of Obligation--they think they're in church just for Sunday Mass.

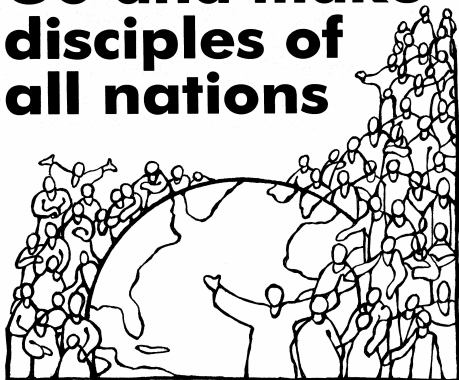
The reader continues:

I know it is up to the diocese but WHY would it be a choice at all? I have many friends from other states and I am the only one who is obligated to attend Mass on Thursday.

Now, we're getting to the heart of the matter. Each ecclesiastical province in the United States is allowed to decide whether to *transfer the celebration* of the feast. (An ecclesiastical province is basically one large archdiocese and the dioceses that are historically associated with it. Generally, in the United States, there's one ecclesiastical province per state, with a few exceptions for historical reasons.) All of the provinces have chosen to *transfer the celebration* except for Boston, Hartford, New York, Newark, **Philadelphia** [which includes Altoona-Johnstown], and the state of Nebraska. With the exception of Nebraska, each of those is one of the oldest Catholic provinces in the United States, which may explain why they've chosen to stick with tradition.

But why is it a choice at all? The answer, whether we like it or not, is a combination of convenience and pastoral considerations. Attendance at Ascension Thursday Masses had been falling for years before the bishops of the United States petitioned the Vatican to allow the *celebration to be transferred* to the following Sunday. That meant that a lot of Catholics were violating a precept of the Church by not celebrating a Holy Day of Obligation.
