Grandparents Take Note

I've spent many long hours listening to grandparents (here and elsewhere) bemoaning the fact that their kids went to 12 (and sometimes 16) years of Catholic education and today those kids are not practicing the Faith. Worse than that, those people say, these "Catholic educated apostates" are passively allowing the grandchildren to head for Hell, because they are not rearing the

young ones in the Faith ... as they promised to do at their Wedding and at the Baptism of each child.

These grandparents either blame the Catholic Schools for not doing their job or blame themselves for not doing their job. Probably, a bit of both factor into creating the complicated mess Boomers and GenXers find themselves in right now. The grandparents want to do something, but what? I think PJII offers an outstanding approach for grandparents to use with both their kids and their grandkids. The former Pope, now beatified, often said that in doing evangelizing we must remember the Catholic Church imposes nothing, but that our Christ founded Church proposes everything - that leads to eternal life.

Grandparents, be gentle as you try to undo the wrong we, you, and they – whoever they are – have done. The best deterrent to bad behavior is good example – especially by grandparents (who are usually respected by adult children and always revered by youthful grandchildren.)

One very small and non-threatening way to get a little religion into the younger set, while conveying at the same time the message that your practice of your religion allows you to include them, would be to make sure they get a copy of our weekly Jr. OLF Bulletin (available on the tables in the back of the church.) The teen crowd can benefit greatly both by the content of teen material in the "racks," and by the fact that you cared enough to reach out specifically to them.

If you can't do a lot, then, do a little. Very often in the long run, the little you do means a lot. Often, grand parenting is more difficult than parenting, because you are entrusted with two generations of candidates for Heaven. Whether or not both make it in is dependant, to some degree, on your efforts.

Join in at home with the worshiping community at Mass and **pray daily** for the sick, in the parish, among our different circles of influence, and in the world at large. One daily petition has to do with victims of specific categories of illness and their care givers. The categories change daily. Another daily petition is as follows:

For the comfort of the sick in the parish family, and the sick among our personal circle of friends, especially those ill persons whom we call to mind in silence ... Let us pray to the Lord, *Lord*, *hear our prayer*.

For privacy concerns, security reasons, and legal considerations we typically avoid announcing names, conditions, and locations of the sick. Also, we don't want to be enablers of erroneous rumors and sinful gossip.
