Six Things You Didn’t Know About Saint Peter Canisius Jesuit, and Doctor

No words ring truer than those above spoken by Saint Peter Canisius, who accomplished much for the Church during his 76 years on earth. The enormity of works, writings, and preachings from Peter give us the example and the courage to pray and labor for God with the gifts and talents He has given us. Peter Canisius is one of the lesser known Doctors of the Church, but his contributions to the Church are magnanimous. Here are six things you didn’t know about this saint.

Peter is the Doctor of Catechetical Studies: Peter lived during the height of the Protestant Reformation, having been born four years after Luther penned his 95 Theses. In an effort to combat Luther’s catechism Peter published his own Catholic Catechism in 1555, called the Summary of Christian Doctrine. This catechism was essential to the Counter-Reformation, was the standard for centuries, and helped renew and strengthen the Catholic faith in Europe.

Patron Saint of Germany: Because of Peter’s long labors in Germany to fight the tide of Protestantism, Peter is often called the “Second Apostle to Germany” after Saint Boniface. Peter started schools and universities, reformed parishes, converted Protestants, and served the infirmed and imprisoned.

Peter was a Jesuit: Soon after receiving a Masters Degree from Cologne at the age of 19, Peter met Blessed Peter Faber, one of the original Jesuits with Saint Ignatius. He was so impressed with Faber that Peter Canisius became a Jesuit himself in 1543. He was the first Dutchman to join the Jesuits.

Helped with the Council of Trent: Some sources cite Peter as the papal theologian during the Council of Trent. It is known that he at least attended many of the sessions. But more importantly, he was chosen as the secret Nuncio in 1565 to get the Council’s decrees throughout Europe, which was a hotbed of Protestantism at that time. As the story goes, the first messenger was caught, and thus Peter was called upon to help with this arduous task. Though he was ardently Catholic, he was respected by the Protestants because of the kindness and charity with which he treated them, and therefore would have been above suspicion of carrying the official documents.

Added a line to the “Hail Mary: As we know, the line “Holy Mary Mother of God pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death” is not found in Scripture the way the rest of the Hail Mary is. Tradition holds that Peter Canisius, who was also known for his Marian theology, began adding the sentence added to the Hail Mary, and it was officially accepted and included in the Catechism of the Council of Trent in 1566.

Creator and Patron of Catholic Press: Though the printing press was developed in the 1400s, Catholics had not made much use of it until Peter Canisius. The Protestants were busy developing their own catechisms in the vernacular and Peter responded with his own, thereby marking the beginning of the Catholic Press. His catechism was so popular that it was printed in at least twelve languages in Peter’s lifetime, and eventually produced hundreds of editions in 26 languages. Peter wrote catechisms, a breviary, and works on Mary. Even after a stroke a few years before his death kept him from writing, he dictated his teachings to his faithful secretary, who made known the words of Saint Peter Canisius.

Prayer:

O God, who for the defense of the Catholic faith made the Priest Saint Peter Canisius strong in virtue and in learning, grant, through his intercession, that those who seek the truth may joyfully find you, their God, and that your faithful people may persevere in confessing you. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. +Amen.

DECEMBER 17, 2017
Scripture Reflection

Today's readings continue the preparation theme we heard in the previous two weeks of Advent. But now the focus shifts somewhat to the joy that awaits us in God's coming Kingdom. This Sunday is Gaudete (Latin, "rejoice") Sunday or, as Pope Francis calls it, the Sunday of Joy.

On the theme of joy, the Church has wisely paired these readings from Isaiah and Mark with a reading from Paul's First Letter to the Thessalonians. Paul admonishes us to always live in joy, praying and giving thanks, because this is God's will for us. Everything we do and say should be inspired by the Spirit as we await the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The Advent readings offer Christians a twofold preparation. They help to prepare the hearts of believers for a new encounter with the mystery of the Nativity. They also teach Christ's disciples how to prepare others for a first arrival of Christ in their lives. Just as John the Baptist prepared the world for Christ's light, so we today must reflect the light we see in Christ and be beacons of hope for the world.

John the Baptist walked a path illumined by a divine light. The Gospel says that John came to testify to the light "so that all might believe through him." Everything John said or did refracted divine brilliance onto those around him. People eventually came to see the light of Christ because they had already seen it shine through John. Writing around the year A.D. 200, the early Christian scholar Origen said, God sends the stars to guide us until we are ready to look at the sun. In the era before modern navigation, the stars guided lost sailors home. If we let Christ's light shine through us, we can be a similar beacon for so many who wander. This is how we can testify to the light today. If we let Christ's light shine through us, we can be the stars they follow.

- Can you allow the surrounding darkness to be swallowed up in the light of Christ?
- Name areas of darkness and areas of light these Advent days.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Last week, we looked at a form of nativity scene called a presipio, characterized by framing the crèche of Jesus with a vast array of personalities and a rich geographical context. The tradition was carried to the New World, and finds very rich expression in Latin America today. While in Europe the presepio was reserved mostly to the homes of wealthy nobles and great churches, in Latin America it was claimed by the poor and expressed the skills of native artisans. In Mexico, you can still find clay figures in every village market. In a way, the native people took the religion of Spanish rule and baptized it with their Indian culture by surrounding the crib of Jesus with local geography and people. In Brazil, where Christmas falls in summer, the figure of the baby Jesus is wrapped in gold and gems, and set on a hillside surrounded by flowers and animals of all kinds. Sometimes there is a double presepio, presenting both Nativity and Crucifixion.

In some places in Latin America, even non-religious people take care to have a presepio in the home, sometimes dedicating one whole room in the house or apartment to the scene. Some cities have markets where people from the countryside sell plants and figurines. In Cuzco, churches and families provide hot chocolate for the children of the poor who come down to help create the nativity scenes. In Paraguay, the baby Jesus grows—the small infant who arrives on Christmas Eve is replaced at New Year with a toddler Jesus who holds in one hand the globe and in the other a cross. Few Christmas traditions have the vitality and variety of presepios and crèches honoring the Nativity.



