Guiding Liturgical Principles

Last week many of the area priests attended a workshop at the Cathedral dealing with the changes themselves as well as how to prepare our people for the changes in the Mass coming in November. Since we cannot gradually implement and utilize the changes until November 26-27 we will have no such thing as a practice Mass. That's why OLF is having bite-sized practice sessions before each 4:30 and 9:00 Mass. Come November 26-27 we will be ready to smoothly and seamlessly make the changes. The handout reprinted below lists some things to sharpen our Mass skills right now. I refer you to #6. Last week I was not sick when I sat down after the Homily. I was simply implementing #6, C).

THE PRINCIPLES

The Church earnestly desires that all the faithful be led to that full, conscious, and active participation in liturgical celebrations called for by the very nature of liturgy. In the reform and promotion of the liturgy, this full and active participation by all the people is the aim to be considered before all else. For it is the primary and indispensable source from which the faithful are to derive the true Christian spirit and therefore pastors must zealously strive in all their pastoral work to achieve such participation by means of the necessary instruction. *Constitution of the Sacred Liturgy Number 14*

- (1) Ideally attempt to involve as many liturgical ministers as possible: reflecting the face of the parish community
- (2) Two lectors at Sunday Mass: one lector for each of the two readings
- (3) Psalmist independent of the cantor
- (4) Third edition of ROMAN MISSAL: lectors enter in the opening procession and take their place in sanctuary until after the second reading. To promote active participation, the people should be encouraged to take part by means of acclamation, responses, psalmody, antiphons, and songs, as well as actions, gestures, and bearing. And at the proper times all should observe a **reverent silence**. *Constitution of the Sacred Liturgy Number 30*
- (5) All are encouraged to sing the acclamations and processional songs: Acclamations: Glory to God; Gospel Acclamation; Holy, Holy; Memorial Acclamation; Great Amen; Lamb of God
- (6) **Reverent silence is to be observed:**
 - A) after introduction to Penitential Rite
 - B) after the first reading and the second reading
 - C) after the homily
 - D) after Communion distribution (Communion Thanksgiving)

Death, Taxes and The Annual Catholic Appeal

These are the only three certainties in our lives. I'm hoping this year to use as little Bulletin ink and space as possible while we reach our goal. Somehow we always manage to reach the assigned goal, but it seems to take so much effort and angst.

I have two suggestions to make it easier on all of us.

One: Sign-up for the electronic withdrawal option for six months. This option allows you to think long term and more easily, or at least less anxiously, make a larger donation.

Two: Take last years total contribution and add 16% to it. Check my math here. Last year I pledged (and paid via the electronic withdrawal option) \$600. This year I should - *make that* - I will pledge (and pay via the electronic withdrawal option) \$695.00. Is that right?

The 16% is not an arbitrary figure. The parish assessment for this year's Annual Catholic Appeal is 16% higher than last year's assessment. If each parishioner family who pledged last year does the same +16% this year, the parish will reach it's goal. Is that right?
