



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New Mass begins First Sunday of Advent 2011

The New Roman Missal

The Maestro, Richard Kuiawa, BS., MA., Ph.D. candidate, will lead us through the intricacies of the *so-called* New Mass on a weekly basis at two weekend Masses.

Beginning the first Sunday of Advent and for each (Saturday) Sunday following Richard will train and retrain us in the basics which will remain constant between the new and old Masses. Plus piece by piece, week by week he will introduce us to and practice us in the changes which will occur officially on November 27, 2011.

Because Rome and the American Bishops have put on the push for more congregational singing, both in terms of hymns, songs and psalms as well as those parts of the Mass like the Lord have mercy, Gloria, Sanctus etc. and sung responses to the priest's sung petitions we, the congregants need both instruction and practice. Richard will give us both.

Weekly at the 4:30 PM Saturday Mass and the Sunday 9:00 AM Mass Richard will take five to seven minutes immediately before the start of Mass to get us up to speed for the coming changes. Some of what he will do will involve refreshing and sharpening us up on some old but rusty techniques and forgotten melodies. But much of what he will be doing (a small dose each week) will be teaching us "how to do" the New Mass.

The 11:00 AM Mass on Sunday mornings will remain largely unchanged, except for the over flow of "energy" coming from those people who go to different Masses from week to week. By the end of the fifty-two week training period the

whole parish should be adequately exposed to the New Mass and fully prepared to experience the celebration of Jesus' Sacrifice at a whole new level. If it is valid --a Mass is a Mass is a Mass. The way we celebrate it doesn't change the Mass, but the devotion with which we celebrate it can and does definitely change us. This is one case where going along will certainly help us get along.

Another change coming in Advent 2010 is our switching everybody's Missalette from the standard size (small print) to the large print size. We'll all have bigger letters and numbers, bigger words and phrases, bigger music notes, and bigger spaces making it much more comfortable to read and sing along.



APOSTOLIC PENITENTIARY, Roma, Italia.

The Apostolic Penitentiary, formerly called the Supreme Tribunal of the Apostolic Penitentiary, is one of the three tribunals of the Roman Curia. The Apostolic Penitentiary is chiefly responsible for issues relating to the issuance and governance of indulgences.

Rome, 8 March 1996

The *Enchiridion Indulgentiarum [assures us that] a **plenary indulgence** is granted to the faithful that devoutly recite the Marian Rosary (even just the one fourth part of it) in a church or oratory.

From the same quoted text it is clear that in no way may it be excluded from the above-mentioned grant the recitation of the Rosary in front of the Blessed Sacrament, both when reserved in the tabernacle and when exposed.

Furthermore, this practice is praiseworthy because whilst our Lord Jesus Christ truly present is adored, also the most Blessed Virgin Mary is invoked with prayers which are essentially biblical (the Our Father, the Hail Mary in its first part, and the Mystery of salvation).

Therefore, the faithful do an excellent thing in continuing such a pious custom in churches.

How to get an Indulgence:

1967, Pope Paul VI issued the apostolic constitution *Indulgentiarum Doctrina*, which established new norms for the use of indulgences. This document introduced the classification of indulgences as partial or plenary.

Partial indulgence: Granted by the Church to "the faithful who at least with a contrite heart perform an action to which a partial indulgence is attached." These individuals "obtain, in addition to the remission of temporal punishment acquired by the action itself, an equal remission of punishment through the intervention of the Church.

Plenary indulgence: "It is necessary to perform the work to which the indulgence is attached and to fulfill three conditions: sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the supreme pontiff. It is further required that all attachment to sin, even to venial sin, be absent."

The conditions may be performed "several days before or after the performance of the prescribed work." The document also established that a single confession may suffice for several plenary indulgences. Praying for the pope's intentions can be satisfied by saying a prayer of one's own choosing, but it is also fulfilled by saying an Our Father and a Hail Mary. "All attachment to sin, even venial sin" means a complete exclusion of sin by the action of the will. It does not mean the elimination of all temptation or concupiscence from one's soul for, as Pope Paul notes, "all men who walk this earth daily commit at least venial sins." **There is a limit of a single plenary indulgence per day, except in case of death.**

Both partial and plenary indulgences can be applied either to oneself or to the departed by way of prayer.

*The Church's official book of indulgences is known as the *Enchiridion Indulgentiarum*, or the Handbook of Indulgences.

HAIL MARY, full of grace, the Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

GLORY BE to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

O MY JESUS, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of Hell; lead all souls to Heaven, especially those in most need of Thy mercy. Amen.

HAIL HOLY QUEEN, mother of mercy; our life, our sweetness, and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this vale of tears. Turn, then, most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us. And after this, our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary. Pray for us, O holy Mother of God, that we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ. Amen.

O GOD, WHOSE only-begotten Son by His life, death and resurrection, has purchased for us the rewards of eternal life; grant, we beseech Thee, that by meditating upon these mysteries of the Most Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we may imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise, through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
